Five months and five shouts


There have been five callouts so far during the quietest time of the year.

The first was to a high speed collision. Two have been to motor cruisers who lost power whilst up-river. One was to investigate a tender reported floating out to sea on Christmas Day and we cannot leave out the ram that went over the cliff!

As the crew said on the day "It is easier to practice on a sheep when it is the first time you have to lift a body out of the water and into the boat for real"

The time between the pager going off and having the boat in the water has reduced from twelve minutes to nine.

Scenario training on the water usually takes place on Tuesday evenings and on Sundays. We have had the first of our regular joint exercises with the local mobile Coastguard teams from Stoke Fleming and Berry Head.

D Class Helms Course

My name is Chris Tracey and in July 2007 I was lucky enough to be selected as a helm of a 'D' Class lifeboat at the new Dart Lifeboat station. After a summer of intensive training on station, I and two others were given the opportunity to go on the 'D' Class helms course at the training college in Poole. The course ran from a Monday to Friday in early December. Having never been to the training college before I was amazed at the facilities at our disposal.

The Training Began

It was an 0830 start in the class room on the Monday where we met all the other helms from stations around Great Britain; there were sixteen of us. The camaraderie between everyone was immediate as we all shared the common bond of being volunteers for such a great service. The instructors briefed us on how our week would pan out and then it was straight into our written evaluation. Our result from this would dictate how we would spend the rest of our week. The better the result the more time you would spend on the water, or if there were certain areas that needed to be addressed then you would have classroom lessons in that area. After the written evaluation we got kitted up and headed out on the water for our waterborne evaluation. This was to cover a whole range of manoeuvres and for the instructors to see how we managed the boat and crew. The idea of this system is to find out everyone's level of experience so that you only cover the areas that you aren't quite so confident with.

Learning on the Water

On Tuesday we were separated into crews of either two or three people, in relation to the areas we would need to work on after our evaluation. I was crewed with "Poms", (Andy Pomeroy) also from Dart Lifeboat station and John from one of the Irish stations. Adam was to be our instructor for the week. We all had a bit of work to do on meteorology, which was to be a short lesson we would have on the Thursday before re-evaluation on the Friday. The next few hours were spent on the water practicing manoeuvres and boat handling. This was incorporated into a mock search for a missing kayaker. For Poms and me this was the first time we had participated in a search, mock or not and was an invaluable lesson. In the afternoon after a fantastic lunch, (who can complain when you are having a choice of roast dinners all week) we were taken to the training pool for capsize drills and basic sea survival. The capsize drill went very smoothly until I dropped the spark plug in the water (this turned out to be quite costly in the bar later that evening) but luckily there was a spare onboard. This was a fantastic experience as the wave machines kicked in and the manufactured thunder and lightning started. Not only was it

great for the overall learning experience but also a great deal of fun. We then headed for dinner just after six. The food all week was amazing and dinner time, followed by the drinks at the college bar, gave a great opportunity to get to know the guys from the other stations and exchange station stories from around the country. The support and acceptance for the three of us from Dart Lifeboat into the RNLi family was mind blowing. In no other area of my life have I experienced such a strong bond with a group of people who only twenty four hours earlier were strangers from all different walks of life.

Into the Gale

On the Wednesday we were lucky enough to have force 7 winds gusting 8 which gave us a brilliant opportunity to do some rough weather handling over the bank just outside Poole harbour. This was followed by an anchoring and veering session onto the beach; the first time I had done this manoeuvre in any sort of swell. It really made me understand why it is classed as a last resort as at one point I nearly flipped the boat. After lunch we were back out on the water again using a Trent class lifeboat to pace against and carry out underway transfers. Again more invaluable experience, especially as pacing is not allowed to be practiced on station. After a welcome cup of coffee onboard the Trent, the light was fading and we spent a couple of hours practicing a night navigation exercise. The following evening we were to be assessed on this. By the time we had finished this exercise it was about 2030 and we headed for dinner. I think everyone was starting to feel the aches and pains for spending such a prolonged period crouched in a 'D' Class.

Thursday brought yet another superb

experience for us as we got to practice helicopter transfers with an Army helicopter from a nearby base. This was then followed by a multi-vessel search for which my crew were chosen to be 'on scene command'. The casualty boat and all casualties were found, all of whom looked very familiar. Nothing like hauling an instructor onboard with enough force to tighten his crutch strap and make his voice squeak. Again we would not finish until 2030 as we had to carry out our night navigation assessment.

On Friday morning we had our re-assessments on our written paper which for me was on meteorology. We then headed out on the water for the last time for an assessment in the form of a search which would incorporate the majority of skills we would need. We then had a de-brief with our instructors and I was happy to receive my RYA Advanced Powerboat certificate.

After lunch we all said our farewells and we left to head back to our respective stations to put into practice all we had learned during the week.

I must say a huge thank you to all fundraisers and donors who provide us with such an excellent training facility and the opportunity to have so much fun whilst being on a serious learning course.

The Appeal moves towards its Target

Significant progress has been made towards our new appeal target of £259,000. Our previous target of £205,000 was extended in January this year to take account of additional ground works that had to be undertaken. At the time of writing we have now raised £232,702 towards this new target.

Despite the economic downturn in the economy the support and enthusiasm for our new station has continued to grow. Two donors, who both wish to remain anonymous, have contributed £30,000 and £15,000 (plus Gift Aid) respectively to our appeal in early 2008. The latter has been donated to specifically fund our new tractor. In addition Mr Mike Felton, the Chairman of Caterfoods, who has funded our new inshore lifeboat due later on this summer, has continued to make approaches on our behalf and secured sponsors for eight crucial items of equipment for the new station.

The Bill Howell Fund, set up by Marilyn Howell and Elizabeth Essex to commemorate Marilyn's husband, have very generously used part of their donation to fund the substantial table and set of chairs for the crew room. A plaque to commemorate Bill has been put on the side of the table.

Recent visitors to the Station have included David Dimbleby, who has very kindly supported our efforts as a Patron of our appeal. Mike and Jane Madigan, who asked for donations towards our appeal, rather than receive wedding

presents, have also been able to see what their generosity has enabled us to achieve.


